#### Administration:

Different administrative units of the University have been computerised using individual software modules. Furthermore, University is in the process of installing University Management System. University has a sound ICT infrastructure through LAN and Wi-Fi.

#### Library:

The Library is fully computerized with the help of open source Library Management System KOHA. The circulation of the books are done through self-check-in and check-out KIOSK from Smart Card RFID system, the users can self-issue and return through KIOSK system. The users of the Library are under CCTV Camera Surveillance and smart gate facility for the security and theft prevention.

Library provides facility for internet browsing for the students, research scholars and faculties. They can browse and access more than 15000 plus E-journal full text online under E-Sodhsindhu (eSS) Library consortium, Developing Library Network (DELNET), DeLCON-DBT Consortium. University also subscribes IEEE database and is extended to all the readers. Under the Shodhganga Electronic Thesis and Dissertations (ETD) project, 45 soft copy of thesis have already been uploaded. Anti-plagiarism software is used to check plagiarism in synopsis, thesis and dissertations.

University ensures quality in teaching and learning through interactive teaching, class seminars, case studies, discussion, practical problems solving, assignments and projects involving exposure to real life situations. Field Visit/Trip/ study tour/survey help the students to get acquainted with field study as a part of syllabi paper. Students get an opportunity to interact with the officials of various organization/institutions which help them to develop self-confidence and improve their knowledge and capacity building skills.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Continuous evaluation through sessional tests, external examiners in paper setting & evaluation, external experts for practical examinations & for project evaluation, students' access to evaluated answer scripts of sessional test for transparency and reliability, letter grading are the key features to maintain quality.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The Office of the Deans of the respective faculties keeps track of the sponsored research projects and consultancy work undertaken by the faculty members of the University. Administrative processes in the execution of the projects are handled by UGC and Project Cell of the University.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Students and faculties can browse and access more than 15000 plus e-journals under E-Sodhsindhu (eSS) Library consortium, Developing Library Network (DELNET) and DeLCON. University also subscribe to IEEE database which is extended to all the readers. Most of the resources and information of the library is accessible through the computer-based interface Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC). Under the Shodhganga Electronic Thesis and Dissertations (ETD) project 45 soft copy of thesis already uploaded. Anti-plagiarism software is used to check plagiarism for synopsis, thesis and dissertations. The circulation of the books are done through self-check-in and check-out KIOSK from smart card RFID system, the users can self-issue and return through KIOSK system.

University has a sound ICT infrastructure through LAN and Wi-Fi. Most of the administrative works are done using computers. Sufficient number of computer terminal spread over the departments, the computer centres, library, etc.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Sponsored Training Programme, RC, OP, National Seminar, International Conferences, FDP, MDP etc.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Faculty and staff recruitment process is conducted transparently following UGC regulations; Reservation policies etc. of Government of India.
