Ph.D COURSE STRUCTURE

The Ph.D. Programme of the Department of Political Science will have two components.

- Course work of one semester along with a dissertation to be completed in the three semesters as per Universities rules and regulations.
- The course work will have three papers
 - 1) Research Methodology.
 - 2) Computer Application.
 - 3) Advanced knowledge on concern subject (to be selected from four optional papers).

PAPER – I : Research Methodology

1. Philosophical foundation of Social Science Research: Purpose of Knowledge in Social Science, Rationalism and Empiricism; Explanation vs understanding in Social Sciences.
2. Approaches to the Social Science Research: Normative, Historical, Behavioural and Marxist. Concept in Social Science Research – Definition, Facts, Concept, Hypotheses.
3. Formulation of a research problem: Selecting a research topic, basic considerations.
4. Data Collection and Analysis: Sources of Data; Methods and Tools of data collection: Observation, Interview, Questionnaire, Schedule, use of library, Sampling techniques, data tabulation and presentation. Use of statistical tools: Mean, Median, Mode and Content Analysis.
5. Presentation of the Report – Types, Content, Format, Principles of writing footnotes, endnotes, bibliography, appendixes references, indexing, glossary.
