## Executive Summary

Mahatma Gandhi's thought on society, economy and politics has wider appeal not only nationally but globally, both among his followers and opponents. Mahatma Gandhi considers his thoughts and values as simple and realistic based on lived experience derived from experimentation. But we are aware about the fact that these simple practices have yielded desired results in our freedom struggle and It has also potential to revolutionize social and political life of the people. His strong protest against imperialism, authoritarianism, communalism and untouchability in the caste system and quest for non- violent, secular and socially just order is unparalleled. However, selective reading and interpretation of Gandhi has been a trend in India. Over a period of time, our imagination of Gandhi has been confined to the Grand Oldman with Stick, his specs and manual spinning wheel. Without interrogating the core values of Mahatma, the above-mentioned portrayal of Mahatma Gandhi has turned into an instrument of trivializing Gandhian essence.

In the 150th year of his birth, it is time to reimagine Gandhi based on our reflexive understanding to ignite the young minds to seek the remedies of the issues and problems being faced by us at local, national and global level or even at interpersonal level. The proposed webinar will focus on the core values of Mahatma Gandhi like truth, non-violence, secularism, emancipation from discrimination, oppression based on caste system. The importance of 'truth' is now being realized in the age of falsehood and fake news circulated through various means of communication. Communalism/ secularism have become global concern with the rise of fundamentalism across the world. Mahatma Gandhi was not averse to changes taking place in society. For Gandhi, the process of change is very important but it must be ethical, nonviolent and democratic, affirming rights to all destitute and minorities. We are living in all-pervading materialistic, uncertain and consumerist culture. This culture has resulted in many pathological consequences in our day today life. Our interpersonal relations and relations with larger social institutions have been shaped by ego, materialistic greed, desire to supersede and hunger for power. This is time to interrogate ourselves. What are we doing? What ought to be done? Can we learn from Gandhian thought, values and practice to reduce our sufferings? If

yes, then we need to unlearn the negativity brought by hyper consumerism and relearn from the 'Mahatma'.

With a view to sensitizing the different stakeholders of the society on Gandhian principles specifically how to disseminate Gandhian values, philosophy, ideas and ideals; to create awareness about Gandhian perspectives on Ecology and Education; and reimagine Mahatma Gandhi in the present day context for a non-violent egalitarian society; the Department of Sociology, Rajiv Gandhi University conducted a One-Day Online National Webinar on the theme "Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi" from 11.00 am to 3.00 pm on 30 August, 2020 (Sunday) through Google Meet in response to UGC D.O. Letter No. 13-52/2018(IC) dated 23<sup>rd</sup> June, 2020.

Under the patronage of Prof. Saket Kushwaha, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, RGU; Prof. Amitava Mitra, Pro-VC; and Prof. Tana Showren, Dean Faculty of Social Sciences, RGU, as Webinar Advisor, the event was graced by distinguished resource persons, Prof. Anand Kumar (Rtd.), Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi, Prof. Deepak Kumar (Rtd.), Zakir Husain Centre for Education Studies,, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi, and Prof. Avijit Pathak, Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi besides senior professors including Prof. Sudhir Kumar Singh, Dean, Academic Affairs, and Prof. S.K. Around 800 applicants ranging across from twenty-eight (28) states and three Union Territories across India and one participant from Bhutan registered for the event. The Inaugural Programme continued for half hour from 11.00 am followed immediately by a Technical Session wherein three eminent Resource Speakers from Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi, India shared their scholarship on various areas of the main theme "Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi".

While Prof. Anand Kumar deliberated on **Learning from life and Practices of Mahatma**, Prof. Deepak Kumar spoke on **Reasons and Rationality in Gandhian Thought Process**, and Prof. Avijit Pathak on **The Gandhian Talisman**. The session was excellently moderated by Prof. Salil Mishra, Pro-Vice Chancellor, Ambedkar University, Delhi. The diverse areas spanned from Champaran movement, ecological

concern, relevance of Gandhian ideas and ideals in civil society, politics and education systems contextualizing the contemporary situation are too relevant for research to be undertaken at various levels. # **Part 1: Preface**

## **1.1. About the Host Institution**

### **The University**

2. to reorient social science scholars to evaluate their research ideas in light of Mahatma Gandhi's social political and economic philosophy
3. to help the common people in understanding the complexities of Social realities and possible Gandhian response to them

#### **1.5. Expected Programme Outcome**

The expected programme outcomes of the webinar were specified below:

1. Inculcating Gandhian way of life through academic discourse among different stakeholders, social sciences research scholars, young faculties, interested individuals in public life, and
2. Creating interests on Gandhian relevance in the contemporary times.

#### **1.6. Theme and Sub-themes**

The main theme, Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi was felt to be so vast in nature that the eminent resource persons were left free of choosing their own expertise areas to



speak on. Hence, the theme did not encourage any sub-theme on the great personality like Mahatma.

## 1.7. Resource Persons

The Webinar witnessed eminent scholars/ activists. The brief details of the resource persons are presented below:

### 1. Prof. Anand Kumar (Rtd.), Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi.

**Anand Kumar** is a retired professor of sociology at Jawaharlal Nehru University. Kumar received an MA in Sociology at the Banaras Hindu University (BHU) 1972; an MPhil. in Sociology at the Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), New Delhi, 1975; and a PhD in Sociology at the University of Chicago,



1986. He was a lecturer in Sociology at BHU from 1979 to 1989, an Associate Professor of Sociology at JNU from 1990 to 1998, and has been a Professor of Sociology at JNU since 1998. Also taught as India Chair in Germany (Albert Ludwig University, Freiburg), GSP Scholar at Humboldt University (Berlin, Germany), He was Fulbright Visiting Scholar at Tufts University from January to May 2013. International Faculty at Innsbruck University (Austria), GSP faculty at FLACSO (Buenos Aires, Argentina), Visiting professor at NEHU (Shillong) and Kashmir University (Srinagar).

### 2. Prof. Deepak Kumar (Rtd.), Zakir Husain Centre for Education Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi

Professor Kumar is an eminent retired academician with an expertise on educational Studies from premier most university named Jawahar Lal Nehru University, New Delhi.

Prof. Kumar has numerous publications and academic achievements to his credit. He is known globally for an empathetic scholarly approach in teaching and learning. **Deepak Kumar** is an Indian historian. His specialization is history of science in India. Currently, he is a Professor of History of Science and Education, at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, India. Kumar has lectured at numerous universities within India and abroad, has held visiting fellowships at the universities of Cambridge, London, Leiden, The Smithsonian Institution, etc. and has also taught at Wisconsin University, Madison, USA, and York University in Toronto, Canada.



He has sought to demonstrate in several of his books that British colonialism in India played a major role in how European scientific fields developed. *Science and the Raj: A study of British India* is one of the pioneer contribution in the field of history of science in India. His latest work *The Trishanku Nation* encapsulates his reflections on contemporary India.

In describing medical encounters in colonial India, Kumar argues that Western medical discourse occupied an important place in the process of colonization and it worked towards a scientific hegemony. "Indigenous systems were so marginalised that their practitioners often sought survival in resistance rather than collaboration."

### **3. Prof. Avijit Pathak, Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi.**

Prof. Avijit Pathak is a senior faculty of Centre for the Study of Social Systems at Jawaharlal Nehru university. His Areas of Interest/Specialization include Sociology of Modernization, Social Theory, Sociology of Education. He holds a vast experience of over three decades of Teaching/Research in JNU. His major publications include Indian Modernity: Contradictions, Paradoxes



and Possibilities; Social Implications of Schooling: Knowledge, Pedagogy and Consciousness; Modernity, Globalization and Identity: Towards a Reflexive Quest; Recalling the Forgotten: Education and Moral Quest; and The Rhythm of Life and Death.

### **1.8. Programme Beneficiaries**

The target audience included every person who is directly or indirectly concerned about Gandhian principles. The online webinar aims to directly benefit students, social sciences research scholars, young faculties and interested individuals in public life.

## **Part 2: Session Wise** **Deliberations**

## 2.1. Inaugural Session

One-Day Online National Webinar on the theme “*Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi*” was organized by the Department of Sociology RGU on 30<sup>th</sup> August 2020 on a Google Meet Platform. Marking the 150<sup>th</sup> Birth Anniversary of the Father of the Nation, the Webinar session was initiated by Dr. Vinod Kumar Yadav, Assistant Professor, Department of Commerce and Coordinator of the Webinar with welcome of all the distinguished resource persons, dignitaries and participants. He stated that the department looks forward to more such collaborative events in the future which would benefit both the faculty members and students in general.

Dr. Shashank Yadav, Assistant Professor, Department of Sociology and Convener of the Webinar introduced the theme “*Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi*” and stated that the webinar was an attempt to explore and re-imagine the ideas and practices of Mahatma Gandhi in the current global scenario. He highlighted the importance of adhering the twin pillars of Mahatma Gandhiji’s teachings- satya [i.e. truth] and *ahimsa* (i.e. non-violence) in the time of unprecedented situation like COVID-19. He emphasized on the need of sensitizing students, academia and the public at large about to the ideas and thoughts of Gandhiji, and urged policy makers, academicians and the civil society to come forward to put strong efforts to establish non-violence in the society through debate and dialogue. In conclusion, he expressed immense gratitude to the Vice Chancellor, Rajiv Gandhi University for conceptualizing the webinar with profound enthusiasm.

Dr. Ravi Ranjan Kumar, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work, RGU as coordinator in his address insisted on the need to understand the subtle nuances of Mahatma Gandhi’s political philosophy and social ethics. He further placed his insights on few of the major lessons derived while visiting and reimagining Mahatma Gandhi.

**A Life with Human Values:** In the deteriorating circumstances of the contemporary era where material and monetary desires have seemed to have taken over core human values like kindness, genuineness, respect for one’s own culture, social fabric etc. It is pertinent to remind ourselves as well as our younger generations that only a life with human values pays the best in long term as they say honesty is the best policy.

**Sanctity of Means and Ends:** Mahatma had always spoken on sanctity of means as well as ends. At a time when there is cut throat competition in every walk of life, it is important to remind ourselves and the youth that there is no beauty in success if means are not correct.

**Love thy Enemy:** An ardent crusader of non-violence, Mahatma had always maintained that peace is unsustainable until it is in thoughts and mind. On that count, a major lesson of his life is that we oppose the bad deed but never the doer.

**Uncompromising Commitments towards Truth and Integrity:** The common man in Mahatma gets special largely due to his complete adherence to truth and total refusal to hypocrisy. At a time when we observe petty interests and greed being guiding force of human endeavours, it is important to remind our younger generations not just through words but through our actions that credibility can't be given or taken but has to be earned.

**Simple Living and High Thinking:** The great soul also famously remembered as a fakir by world leaders of his era, through his life of an ascetic puts a strong message to our growing materialistic culture that greatness is not in material possessions but in simplicity.

**Empathy and Antyodaya:** COVID 19 crisis reminds humanity that our priorities must be right. In this regard, Mahatma stands relevant for he always emphasized on developing the last in the ladder and fulfilling our basic needs by our own as much as possible, for a Safe, Sustainable and Self-Reliant Future.

Prof. Amitava Mitra, Pro VC, RGU, congratulated the collaborative effort of the three departments and devoted his address to a less explored aspect of Gandhiji – Gandhi and his economic thoughts. At the very outset, Prof. Mitra enunciated that Gandhiji was not an economist but he had advocated certain policies for Indian economy like improving the economy of villages because he believed it would provide maximum employment and income along with establishing equality, freedom and justice. He said that Gandhiji believed in the self-sufficiency of villages where surplus could be sold in the market and worked for the promotion of *swadeshi* goods like *khadi*. In conclusion, he opined that nature produces enough to satisfy everybody's need but not for everybody's greed. Unfortunately, the present world is full of greed and hence the resulting environmental degradation and climate deterioration. Therefore, he stressed on the need to revisit Gandhi's economic thoughts of self-reliance and self-sufficiency.

Prof. Saket Kushwaha, VC, RGU, in his address congratulated the three departments and expressed his happiness over the in-house manpower of RGU for organizing the one day symposium together in collaboration. He said that as his role as VC, it's his duty to push all the departments to conduct seminars (now webinars) not merely to fulfill the academic mandate of UGC but to learn and observe these programs with fruitful outcomes. Speaking about the present scenario, he said that lessons need to be embedded in the students and pedagogy needs to be percolated in students through new normals like webinars especially now during the pandemic. Focusing on New Education Policy 2020, the VC said the salient features or objectives of the NEP 2020 are a replica of the Wardha Scheme of Basic Education, 1937, which is also known as Nayi Talim or Buniyadi Talim of which Gandhi was the main proponent. At the Wardha Conference held on October 22-23, 1937, presided over by Gandhi himself, some of the resolutions passed were free and compulsory education to be provided for seven years at a nationwide scale and choosing mother tongue as the medium of instruction. Mentioning these key points, the VC said that it took more than 70 years to follow the educational principles envisioned by the Mahatma. He urged for a need to revisit Gandhi by doing away with the notion of "apna apna Gandhi" and not just remembering the Mahatma when it suits our personal interests. Lastly, he called out to all the teachers to have a heart and power in mind to bring a change in the society and encouraged the young generation to revisit Gandhiji's ideas and thoughts in the right perspective to truly achieve success.

Bringing the webinar to a close, Mr. Bikas Bage, Director of the Webinar, Department of Sociology, proposed the vote of thanks. He expressed his deepest gratitude to Prof. Saket Kushwaha, VC, RGU, also the Patron of the webinar, for his constant guidance and support and gracing his presence as Chairperson of the Inaugural Session. He thanked and congratulated the Coordinators of the webinar and his Co-conveners for the successful completion of the webinar. He also thanked all the distinguished resource persons for having consented to be a part of the programme and shared their insightful expertise on the theme selected and scholars for their active participation. He too thanked the participants from across twenty-eight states and three union territories of the country for responding to this national webinar to actively participate in the deliberations on ideas and ideals of Mahatma Gandhi as to why there is still a need to revisit Gandhi in the context context.

The inaugural session was followed by a technical session which comprised of five illuminating presentations from members of national and international academia who covered various facets of the theme *Reimagining Mahatma Gandhi*. The three resource persons were **Prof. Anand Kumar (Rtd.)**,

**Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi.** who spoke on the theme titled on “**Learning from life and Practices of Mahatma**”, **Prof. Deepak Kumar (Rtd.), Zakir Husain Centre for Education Studies,, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi,** spoke on “**Reasons and Rationality in Gandhian Thought Process**”, and the **Prof. Avijit Pathak, Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi,** deliberated on “**The Gandhian Talisman**”. All three sessions were moderated by Dr. Ravi Ranjan Kumar, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work RGU.

## 2.2. Technical Sessions

**Moderator:** Dr Ravi Ranjan Kumar, Assistant Professor, Department of Social Work RGU.

**First Speaker: Prof. Anand Kumar (Rtd.), Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi** has delivered expert deliberation on themes: *Learning from Life and Practices of Mahatma*.

### Summary:

Prof. Kumar in his introductory part utter the significance of Teaching and Learning prospect in all the aspect of life. Where he also emphasised the role of academicians in nation building process. Prof. Kumar also highlights the impact of Mahatma Gandhi's ideologies in changing the course of history of our Country (India). Further he importantly realised the people and young scholars and youth of the nation to remember the Sacrifices, Imagination and Contribution that Mahatma Gandhi has bestowed for our country. Further, he remarkably highlights the core issue that people often failed in understanding Gandhi and his Ethics and linking & applying Gandhian thought in their personal life. He also narrated that the Mahatma Title was conferred to him by Subhas Chandra Bose. He also insightfully narrates that Mahatma Gandhi was strongly against Class-War. Therefore, Gandhiji was more prone towards idea of Economic Equality rather than Economic Exploitation. Prof. Kumar insightfully talks on issues like Swaraj, Swadeshi, etc. principles of Gandhi. He also importantly bring the attention of the participants that- Gandhian notion of Swaraj is incomplete till if there exist exploitation in the field of political, Economical, social, communal, etc. in our society. He also appealed the participants to read more on books on Gandhi. In his concluding he remarks that Gandhian ideologies has still relevance today and it will be in days to come. He also thankful to the organiser of the webinar and suggest everyone to work on their weakness.



**Second Speaker: Prof. Deepak Kumar (Rtd.), Zakir Husain Centre for Education Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi** has significantly reflected on theme: *Reason and Rationality in Gandhian Thought Process*.

**Summary:**

Prof. Deepak Kumar has notably reminded us that it is so tough to talk on such renounce person like Mahatma Gandhi. He also assured that Gandhian thought has significantly impact on many section of society. He importantly highlight the Gandhian principle of Satyagraha. Further, Prof. Kumar referred that Gandhiji has more mixed kinds of personality rather than simply lawyer. Gandhiji has almost expert approach on certain aspect of life like media, politics, etc. He also said that Mahatma Gandhi was a very good listener too. He also said that it is very disheartened to see that Mahatma Gandhi is being criticized and troll in many social media platform by some indecent people. Prof. Deepak Kumar also remarks that Gandhi was like an open book. He can be read by anyone. Prof. Kumar cautious us that both good and evil are within us (Ram & Ravan aapke ander hai). Like Prof. Anand Kumar he also emphasised that Gandhi was a great Learner not Dictator. He also acknowledged the Organizing Committee and RGU Fraternity for conducting such praiseworthy webinar on such relevance topic.

**Third Speaker: Prof. Avijit Pathak, Centre for the Study of Social Systems, Jawaharlal Nehru University, Delhi** also insightfully delivered expert analysis on theme: *Gandhi & Youth*.

**Summary:**

Prof. Pathak also like previous speakers remarks the relevance of Gandhian thought in current society. He specially focus on the issues like Evolving & Experimental Gandhi, Gandhi-Decolonizing the mind and other issues, and on Religiousity notion of Gandhian thought. Prof. Pathak also highlight the incident that how Gandhiji deal with the Caste tussle that Gandhiji has went through in context to his experimental with truth. Where Gandhiji was warned by the Caste Association that if he (Gandhi) went to London he will be Outcasted from the Caste Community. As the reason sought by the Caste Association was that if Gandhi went to England than he has to sit with different types of Lower Caste people thereby Gandhi may pollute their caste. Prof. Pathak also notably remark that the Dignity of Individual lies in the dignity of Society. He also in his concluding parts remark that Gandhi was more favoured towards Hindu-Muslim Unity. And we should also follow his footprint to achieve peaceful and mutual co-existence. Lastly, he also appealed all the participants to read more to clear any doubts. Also one should believe in their colleagues for certain information rather than simply or blindly following Social media information and resources.

The Technical Session was excellently moderated by Dr. Ravi Ranjan Kumar, corroborating insightful facts about Gandhian ideas and ideals as to why there is need to reimagining Mahatma Gandhi even today. At the end, the 'Vote of Thanks' was proposed by Mr. Bikash Bage, Webinar Director of the National Webinar.

The most important part of the National Webinar was the number and nature of questions raised from the participants' side which were subsequently taken up and dealt well by the individual Resource Persons. There were too good number of complimentary messages received from the participants in the chat-box for the Resource Persons as well as for the organizing committee of the National Webinar for arranging such programme online and allowing them to know more about the valuable Gandhian ideas and philosophy and connecting their relevance to present context.

## **Part 3: Major Takeaways**

### 3.1. Academic Context

It is an exceedingly difficult time to invoke Gandhi. It is also a difficult time because truth is manufactured especially in social media, and dissent is nipped in the bud as put forth by eminent academician Prof. Avijit Pathak during third technical session. Mahatma Gandhi's thought on society, economy and politics has wider appeal not only nationally but globally, both among his followers and opponents. Mahatma Gandhi considers his thoughts and values as simple and realistic based on lived experience derived from experimentation. But we are aware about the fact that these simple practices have yielded desired results in our freedom struggle and It has also potential to transform social and political life of the people.

His strong protest against imperialism, authoritarianism, communalism and untouchability in the caste system and quest for non-violent, secular and socially just order is unparalleled. However, selective reading and interpretation of Gandhi has been a trend in India. Over a period of time, our imagination of Gandhi has been confined to the Grand Oldman with Stick, his specs and manual spinning wheel. Without interrogating the core values of Mahatma, the above-mentioned portrayal of Mahatma Gandhi has turned into an instrument of trivializing Gandhian essence. Gandhi was a very patriarchal man in his initial days in the words of Prof Anand Kumar during first technical session. However, towards the later days he became one of the ardent feminist and he could bring thousands of women into public life.

The proposed webinar focused on the core values of Mahatma Gandhi like truth, non-violence, secularism, emancipation from discrimination, oppression based on caste system. The importance of 'truth' is now being realized in the age of falsehood and fake news circulated through various means of communication. Communalism/ secularism have become global concern with the rise of fundamentalism across the world. Mahatma Gandhi was not averse to changes taking place in society.

Taking this situation into consideration the national webinar on the theme *Reimagining Gandhi Today* was conceptualized and accordingly contributed with thrust areas of looking at Gandhi and the relevance of his ideas in twenty-first century.

### **3.2. Research Context**

In the words of Prof Anand Kumar, one of the resource persons, people in contemporary times wish to live by the nature. Gandhi was one of the pioneers of the nature's way of living. Gandhi became Gandhi by reading, thinking and living the way he preached. Therefore, for today's generation this should be the great learning from Gandhi. The process of change for Gandhi, is very important but it must be ethical, nonviolent and democratic, affirming rights to all destitute and minorities. We are living in all-pervading materialistic, uncertain and consumerist culture.

This culture has resulted in many pathological consequences in our day to day life. Our interpersonal relations and relations with larger social institutions have been shaped by ego, materialistic greed, desire to supersede and hunger for power. This is time to interrogate ourselves. What are we doing? What ought to be done? Can we learn from Gandhian thought, values and practice to reduce our sufferings? If yes, then we need to unlearn the negativity brought by hyper consumerism and relearn from the 'Mahatma'.

### **3.3. Policy Making and Practice Context**

The policy of corporatization is not tenable for the long run. The process of mindless corporatization has led to deep rooted discontents around the globe. The onset of the corona virus pandemic could be a case in point. In this context, one can look at Gandhi who was truly a global citizen and advocated for austerity in life. Therefore, we need to look at Gandhi's Sarvodaya for guidance. Gandhi could be a speed breaker to this process of mindless corporatization. Wealth has to be distributed as rain falls on earth. When rain water falls, it does not distinguish between people, rich or poor, higher caste or lower caste etc. In such a manner wealth has also to be

distributed among the people without any control over it. The life of Gandhi where we see that he was continuously evolving teaches us that life is a domain of possibilities.

In today's time there is a need to move from opportunism to truth. Gandhi advocated for truth but the society we live in today has moved towards opportunism, therefore there is a need to reimagining Gandhi today. One may differ with Gandhi but he will always be relevant to humanity.

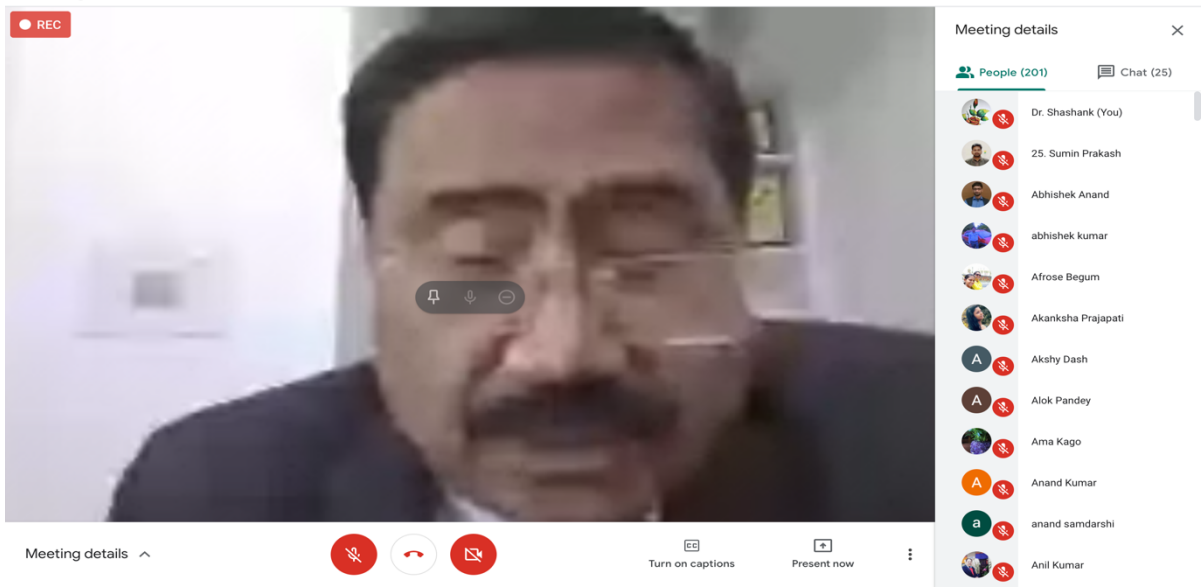

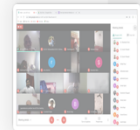
