OVERVIEW

A Scholar of Social Work may opt for any one or two maximum papers among the elective papers on offer in consultation with Research Advisory Committee (RAC). In any case, the minimum credits to be completed by a Ph.D. scholar would be Twelve (12) and Maximum upto Sixteen (16). Students will have to secure minimum passing marks of 55% each paper in their Term End Examinations for successfully completing the course work.
