OVERVIEW

As per the University ordinance, the research scholars who are provisionally registered for the Ph.D. programme will have to undergo a Pre-Ph.D. Course Work. Course curriculum for Ph.D. Course Work in social work includes two papers comprising of PHDSW01 - Theoretical Framework for Social Work Research and PHDSW02 - Advance Research in Social Work. Every theory paper consists of 100 marks which includes 30 marks for internal assessment and 70 marks for term end examination. There will be three internal assessments for each theory paper from which highest two will be considered for final evaluation. Students will have to secure minimum passing marks in their Internal Assessments for appearing in Term End Examination. Overall Ph.D. course work in social work has 200 marks. Students have to secure Minimum marks for completion of each paper. The three internals for each paper may be categorized as below:
