EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Disasters threaten the lives, constitutional rights and needs of the children worldwide. In past two decades India have faced devastating disasters such as Latur Earthquake (1993), Odisha Super Cyclone (1999), Bhuj Earthquake (2001), Indian Tsunami (2004), Jammu & Kashmir Earthquake (2005), Bihar Floods (2008), Uttarakhand Floods (2013), Cyclone Phailin (2013), Chennai Flood (2015), Kerala Flood (2018), and Cyclone Fani (2019).

Droughts are slow onset disasters, adversely affecting children and women alike.

Karnataka (16 districts) and Andhra Pradesh (4 districts) experienced at least 10 droughts between 2001- 2015. During these emergencies, children are especially vulnerable to diseases, malnutrition, and violence and trafficking. Measles, diarrhoea, acute respiratory infections, malaria and malnutrition are the major killers of children during humanitarian crises. In future, vulnerability of children is expected to increase as the intensity and frequency of natural disasters rises.

Keeping in view the increasing vulnerability of children from climate change and natural disasters, National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India has established "**Child Centric Disaster Risk Reduction (CCDRR) Centre**" to mainstream child centric DRR activities through Training, Research, Advocacy and Consultancy.

PART-1 : PREFACE 01.RAJIV GANDHI UNIVERSITY

The foundation of the Rajiv Gandhi University (Formerly Arunachal University) was laid on 4th February 1984 by Late Smt. Indira Gandhi, the then Prime Minister of India. The University is located a top Rono Hills on a picturesque tableland of 302 acres overlooking the river Dikrong. The University was converted into a Central University with effect from 9th April 2007 as per notification of Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. Since then Rajiv Gandhi University (Formerly Arunachal University) has carved a niche for itself in the educational scenario of the country. a. Registration

Zoom platform was used for this programme. The Training programme was conducted through power point presentation by the Resource Persons/Speaker/Experts as per their programme schedule. The entire programme was also streamed live on you tube.

c. Evaluation

At the end of the programme, the participants were provided with online evaluation form in the group to evaluate their learning and understanding about the programme.

PART-2: PROCEEDINGS OF THE PROGRAMME

There were total six technical sessions in the programme in which two technical sessions were delivered each day.

a. Inaugural Session



At the very outset Mr. Sushant Kumar Nayak, co-coordinator and Moderator for the inaugural session greeted the participant and invited Prof, Kesang Degi Head Department of Education for welcome speech.



Prof, Kesang Degi Head Department of Education, welcomed Prof. Saket Kushwaha, Honourable Vice chancellor, Rajiv Gandhi University, Major General Manoj Kumar Bindal Dr. Balu, I. and all

distinguished speakers and participants. After welcoming address Prof. Degi invite Dr. P.K Barik to introce the Chief Guest of the Inaugural Session of three day programme on CCDRR.



Dr. P.K Barik introduced the Chief Guest of the Inaugural

Programme, Honerable Vice Chancellor, Rajiv Gandhi University, Rono Hills, Doimukh, Prof. Saket Khuswaha.



Prof. Saket Khuswaha in his inaugural address highlighted that risk can be managed through time series data whereas uncertainty has a little problem for managing the welfare of the child. He stressed on creating confidence and cultivating

positive attitudes among the children for their overall development. According to him dignity of the child is significant as equal as dignity of man. He suggested extreme care is needed during this pandemic situation for their overall development.



Major Genaral Manoj Kumar Bindal highlited on the importance of three day training programme for practitioners, teachers, students and parents. In his lecture Major Bindal said that almost 40% of the child population needs to be focused for their safety. He also stressed on the

preparation of children to counter the disaster and risk in their life. The importance of Child Centric Disaster Risk Reduction should be sensitized to all the stakeholders.



The vote of Thanks was extended by Dr. Tayum Saroh who was also a coordinator of the three day programme on Child Centric Disaster Risk Reduction.

b. Day – 1 (Technical Session)

TECHNICAL SESSION - I



The First and Second Technical Session of the Day One were taken by **Dr. Balu I** from CCDRR, NIDM and moderated by Mr. Narender Singh, Assistant Professor, Department of Education, RGU. Dr Balu I, in his first lecture on **"Do's and Don'ts during the COVID 19"** started from historical background of COVID

19 that how First case of Corona virus was detected in a 55 year old man in Wuhan, a Chinese city, in the month of December 2019 and in India it was reported in January 2020. He clarified the misconceptions about symptoms of the Corona Virus and how to distinguish it from normal flu. Dr. Balu also stated about the current status of recovered, active cases and deaths that have taken place in India and abroad and mentioned about Government of India's initiatives like **Jan Andolan** Campaign launched by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi in view of the upcoming festivals and winter season as well as opening of the economy to tackle

the pandemic. He explained proper and improper ways of wearing a mask, practice of hand washing, importance of practice of social distancing with a slogan "**Do Gaj ki Duri Hum Sab ke Liye Jaroori**", following shopping rules and importance of re arrangement of seats in office, classroom and taking exams etc. In the end of the first technical session Dr. Balu addressed the quarries of the participants.



TECHNICAL SESSION – II

In his second technical session of the day on the topic "**Basic Concept and Hazard Profile of India**" **Dr. Balu** explained the meaning of various basic terms like disaster, hazard, disaster risk, vulnerability, exposure, capacity, disaster damage , mitigation , preparedness, preventions, reconstruction, recovery, resilience and response with the

help of active participation of the participants . Dr. Balu after explaining the terms with the help of a picture invited participants to explain the meaning citing an example from their own surrounding and situation. He made the session so interactive that that session lasted beyond the schedule time and participants' huge response was an indication of the outcome of the session. Second technical session of the day ended with vote of thanks from Dr. P K Barik.

c. Day -2 (Technical Sessions)

TECHNICAL SESSION - III



On the Second Day, two technical sessions were conducted on two different topics on CCDRR. The Third technical session of the programme of was taken by **Ms Namartha** from Y.W.C.A., New Delhi on the topic "**Mental Health of Children in the Time of Disaster.**" Before coming to her lecture she discussed a little bit about Corona virus preventive

measures. The focus of her address was psychological perspective among children in the time of Covid 19. She talked about various stages of development, psychological and physiological changes occurring among adolescents during adolescent period and how any disaster impacts mental health of the children. She said estimates of prevalence of trauma in world population is projected to be between 33% to 90% and in children it is higher but mostly it is an ignored in developing countries. She concluded that even after more than a month of triggering event people relive the event via: intrusion, flashbacks, nightmares, avoidance of remembering trauma and intense anxiety. She said that child suffer from stress even more than adults do, as they are exposed to new confusing environment constantly, their sense of self is intimately tied to the expectation posed by the adults around them such as parents and teachers but can also be influenced by their peers and discussed various ways to avoid negative impact of mental stress by providing emotional , physical support, giving them appropriate attention , spending quality time with them and making intellectual interactions with them. In the end she took quarries from the participants.

TECHNICAL SESSION - IV



Fourth technical session of the programme was taken by **Dr. Balu. I** from CCDRR, NIDM on the topic "**Introduction to CCDRR**". Dr.Balu explained the historical background of development of institute and objectives behind it. He cited the examples of Karnataka and Andhra draughts from 2010 to 2015 which lead to 36.2% of child stunning and 26.1% of wasting in Karnataka and how voices of children are not heard

and further how they are harmed, abused and exploited after disaster. He also explained how we need to involve children in disaster risk reduction because they have a right to participation, children are able to convey message with meaning, children are more willing to learn and develop a culture of adaptation, children offer immense creativity and more important children are able to participate beyond a disaster preparedness role and cited various child centric Disaster risk reduction activities. In the end, Dr. Balu addressed the quarry raised by the participants.

d. Day 3 (Technical Sessions)



TECHNICAL SESSION - V

Fifth technical session was taken by Mr Ranjan Kumar, NIDM, Vijaywada on the topic "Disaster Impact on Children" and was moderated by Dr. C S Sankar, Assistant Professor, Department of Education, Rajiv Gandhi Univeristy, Dr.Ranjan Kumar in his address highlighted on the effects of disaster on children, effect on schooling and on their mental health. He also explained children

may become upset, experience fear and stress during disaster. It has been observed that the impact of disaster among children made them bonded labour, orphan, child marriage, child labour and child trafficking.

TECHNICAL SESSION – VI



Sixth and the final technical session was taken by Dr. Kumar Raka, Programme Officer CCDRR Centre, New Delhi on the topic "Home to home school safety." He explained Basic principles of safety of students, teachers, staff and explained why sick person whether teacher, staff or students should not come to

school. He also highlighted on safe use of water, benefits of regular hand wash, maintaining social distancing and wearing mask to help stop spread of sickness. Dr Kumar Raka emphasised that we need to stay informed about covid-19 through reputed sources such as UNICEF, WHO, and national health ministry advisories and be aware of fake information / myths that may circulate by word of mouth or online .Session ended with vote of thanks Dr. C S Shankar.

e. Valedictory Session

In the valedictory session, Dr. Tayum Saroh welcomed all the dignitaries to the programme. Dr. P. K. Barik read the overall report of the program. Then Dr. I. Balu introduced about Prof. Santosh Kumar.



Prof. Santosh Kumar highlighted on the participation of Indian Universities and other sectors in disaster management and risk reduction programs to serve the community. He focused on the hazards, risk vulnerability issues. He also highlighted that when we work together the risk and hazard

will be minimum. He pointed on the role of society, role of different agencies of education and other programs are closely associated with the disaster risk reduction. He also highlighted about the capacity building development among the individuals to tackle the issues related to child safety and hazards. He focused on the preparedness of individuals towards the different natural hazards and man-made hazards. He stressed open our responsibility and resilience's towards the society. He reminded the issues and challenges of our daily life and how to mitigate them.

Then the guest of honor Dr. N. T. Rikam, registrar, Rajiv Gandhi University was introduced by Mr. S. K. Nayak.



Dr. Rikam rightly pointed the sources of risk and disaster with respect to North Eastern region and Arunachal Pradesh, like earthquakes, landslide floods etc. He urged that we have to prepare ourselves to overcome these hazards and disasters. He highlighted that the awareness and training is much necessary in this

juncture. He praised the NIDM and Department of Education, Rajiv Gandhi University for organizing such and program pertaining to child's health risk related issues. He also highlighted that training and awareness on the children's mental health and mental Horizon/makeup is much necessary now, so that the young learners will be adequately adapt themselves to the disasters and child centric issues. He also told that child'sare very vulnerable during disaster times, so we have to prepare for it.

Then, Dr. P. K. Barik introduced the chief guest of the program Prof. Amitabh Mitra, Pro-Vice Chancellor, Rajiv Gandhi University. Prof. Mitra firstcongratulated the Department of Education and NIDM authority for successful organization of the webinar and he also highlight that India is the most disaster prone country in the world. He also classified about different kinds of disasters like natural disaster and man-made disasters and how we have to prepare and give proper training and how to overcome this kind of situations. He aptly told that we cannot stop disasters but we can reduce the risk of disaster or disaster losses. He pointed that three steps strengthening the public preparedness, awareness of the people and proper supply chain management, can do the disaster mitigation. He also said that children are the most affected during the disaster times and they need the support in

every level in local level, in state level, in country level, in international level. He also highlight that children's are the future of the country and they need to aware and train themselves to overcome it. He stressed upon the disaster curriculum to be made compulsory in every level in school, college and university. The programme was concluded by vote of thanks by Dr. I. Balu.

- (A) Immediate Implications in the context of knowledge: after attending the 3 days programme on child centric disaster risk reduction the participant have been well acquainted with the:
- 1. Impacts of different types of disaster on children both mentally and physically.
- 2. Children rights- national and international for the protection of the children and could explained the same at time of need hour.
- 3. Process of mainstreaming child- centric risk management at different situations.
- 4. Life cycle approach and risk- informed approach for child-centric risk reduction
- 5. Strategies for school safety with the engagement of children
- 6. Disaster impact on mental health of the Children

BACKGROUND OF THE PROGRAMME

Disasters threaten the lives, constitutional rights and needs of the children worldwide. In past two decades India have faced devastating disasters such as Latur Earthquake (1993), Odisha Super Cyclone (1999), Bhuj Earthquake (2001), Indian Tsunami (2004), Jammu & Kashmir Earthquake (2005), Bihar Floods (2008), Uttarakhand Floods (2013), Cyclone Phailin (2013), Chennai Flood (2015), Kerala Flood (2018), and Cyclone Fani (2019).

Droughts are slow onset disasters, adversely affecting children and women alike. Karnataka (16 districts) and Andhra Pradesh (4 districts) experienced at least 10 droughts between 2001- 2015. During these emergencies, children are especially vulnerable to diseases, malnutrition, and violence and trafficking. Measles, diarrhoea, acute respiratory infections, malaria and malnutrition are the major killers of children during humanitarian crises. In future, vulnerability of children is expected to increase as the intensity and frequency of natural disasters rises.

Keeping in view the increasing vulnerability of children from climate change and natural disasters, National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India has established "Child Centric Disaster Risk Reduction (CCDRR) Centre" to mainstream child centric DRR activities through Training, Research, Advocacy and Consultancy.
