

Republic Day Speech 26th January, 2022

On this auspicious occasion I want to convey this to all my friends, employees, students and everyone else that in our everyday conduct and action we should be honest and dedicate ourselves to the nation. The national festival of Republic Day which is celebrated across the country irrespective of religion, caste, gender and community harmoniously with the spirit goodwill towards one another is a day of great pride for us as it is a symbol of us being the citizens of an independent country. 26th January was chosen as the Republic Day because it was on this date in 1929 that the Indian National Congress had declared *Purna Swaraj* from British rule. This day is an occasion for us to remember and pay homage to all our freedom fighters who laid down their lives for enabling us to breathe in free air. 26th January is very important for every Indian as it was on the 26th of January 1950 that the Constitution of our country came into force and India became a Sovereign Socialist Secular Democratic Republic. The Constitution of India is the longest constitution in the world. There are 395 Articles and 12 Schedules in the Indian Constitution which are divided into 22 parts.

It took nearly two and a half years in preparing this Constitution. The Constitution of India guarantees all its citizens the right to education, right to equality, right to expression and several other rights for the better realization of a fulfilled life. The implementation of the

words of the Constitution greatly helped in abolishing certain evil practices rampant in the Indian society such as the practice of discrimination on the basis of caste and community.

Netaji Subhash Chandra has rightly:

“Life loses half of its interest if there is no struggle, if there are no risk to be taken. It is our duty to pay for our liberty with our own blood.”
